B'NAI TIKVAH SCHOLAR-IN-RESIDENCE SHALOM ORZACH Sundays, 10:30 am

October 21 - *Every Dream Requires a Dreamer, Every Action Requires an Actor* **-** The Establishment of the State of Israel required audacious dreamers and courageous doers. What is striking in the Israel story is that many were both. We will meet some of them and learn about their contributions in making the dream a reality.

October 28 - On Being a Citizen of the Jewish World in the Modern Era -What does it mean to be a citizen of the Jewish world today?

November 4 - *Belonging or Believing* - This dilemma has become one of the core challenges facing the Jewish community. To this extent we have moved from being the Chosen to the Choosing People. How can our engagement with Israel enrich and inform these choices?

Shalom Orzach is a senior educator and consultant for the iCenter, and serves on the faculty for the Foundation for Jewish Camp. He teaches a course in experiential education at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. He was the Central Shaliach for USY. He is an acclaimed public speaker on contemporary Israel who brings extensive knowledge, humor and passion. He has published articles on Israel and Jewish education in the Times of Israel and eJewishPhilanthropy.

RABBI STEVEN BOB

Rabbi Steven Bob will teach a three-part course on the commentaries to three key verses in the Book of Jonah. He will bring these ancient verses alive showing important connections to our lives today.

December 2 - We will seek to understand what exactly swallowed Jonah.

December 9 - We will explore how the rabbis view Jonah's ship as a microcosm for the entire world.

December 16 - We will look at the conclusion of the Book of Jonah, 4:10-11.

Rabbi Steven Bob is the author of 'Jonah and the Meaning of Our Lives: A Verse by Verse Contemporary Commentary," recently published by JPS, and "Go To Nineveh: Medieval Jewish Commentaries on the Book of Jonah." He is recognized as an expert on Yom HaShoah and is the founder of the Fourth Day Initiative, an interfaith solar energy project.

Rabbi Bob served as Senior Rabbi of Congregation Etz Chaim for 35 years. His delight in the Bible, his sense of humor, his love of teaching and learning, and his ability to connect with people of all ages are some of the gifts he brings to everything he does.

RACHEL HAVRELOCK, PH.D.

Topic: The Books of Ezra and Nehemiah

Ezra and Nehemiah chronicle the return of Judean exiles from far-flung locales in the Persian Empire to Jerusalem where they reestablished the Temple and a small polity around it. As we study the books, we will examine the decisions made by the returning Judeans, discuss their motivations, and consider the legacy of these momentous decisions.

February 10 - *The Return* - The return of exiles to Jerusalem marks a momentous restoration. Why did the Persian Empire authorize the migration? How were the leaders of the returning community chosen? What was it like to arrive in an unfamiliar homeland? What might have been left behind? How did the fact of return frame Judean history? What were the barriers to rebuilding the Temple?

February 24 - *The Land* - Not all Judeans and Israelites experienced exile, instead many communities remained within the land and adapted to its changing circumstances. The encounter between the remaining and returning communities involved several clashes. What were the issues that divided these communities? How did this friction feed the development of different movements at the time and in later Judaism?

March 3 - *The Lineage* - Among the legacies of The Books of Ezra and Nehemiah is the notion that being a Judean – later a Jew – involves a distinct hereditary. Such a notion about identity stands at the center of the books' controversial scenes of the mandatory divorce of non-Judean women.

March 10 - *The Torah* - Ezra was a scribe who produces and reads a manuscript before the community. What was the nature of the document that Ezra produced and what are some of the traditions regarding Ezra as a scribe?

Rachel Havrelock is Associate Professor of Jewish Studies and English at the University of Illinois at Chicago. Rachel's book, *River Jordan: The Mythology of a Dividing Line* illustrates her distinct methodology of combining biblical studies, literary and political theory, and the politics of interpretation.

Rachel's current book project, *The Joshua Generation: Politics and the Promised Land*, focuses on the structure and meanings of the book of Joshua.

Rachel co-edits *AJS Perspectives:* The Magazine of the Association for Jewish Studies with Professor Matti Bunzl. She has been teaching classes at B'nai Tikvah for the past seven years.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL PROGRAMS

FAMILY EDUCATION

Family Education happens several times a year for Pre-K through 7th grade, during Religious School from 9-10 am. They will highlight content taught within the Religious School Curriculum as well as working on Social Action Projects.

JUNIOR CONGREGATION

Students in Kindergarten through 6th grade will engage in the Shabbat Morning experience twice a month from 10:00-12:00 pm. Students will be divided into appropriate age groupings and will create a Shabbat experience with their peers that is age and developmentally appropriate. They will help to lead their own service, engage in Torah study, discuss Mitzvot and Middot and have the opporunity to spend Shabbat morning with their Religious School friends.

B'NAI MITZVAH SEMINAR

During 6th grade, families will meet once a month on Sunday mornings to study the process of becoming B'nai Mitzvah as a family and will explore Jewish texts, what it means to participate in social action and social justice. Monthly sessions will be taught by Rabbi Alex and Carly Valfer.

BEYOND BAR/BAT MITZVAH

MOVING TRADITIONS

Moving Traditions' approach to educating Jewish pre-teens and teens is rooted in this multi-dimensional view of character development. Their signature programs, Rosh Chodesh and Shevet, will challenge your teens to think critically about and apply Jewish wisdom to the issues that matter to them most, including academic stress, friendship, body image, and peer pressure.

8th Grade

Students will focus on Hot Topics regarding being a Jewish teen in today's world and will explore their place in the different communities that they are a part of. They will also spend time being mentored as they begin their work as Madrichim. Students will continue their study of Jewish history from the creation of the State of Israel to present day, and will prepare for their Ta'am Yisrael Trip.

9th Grade

Students will focus on their relationship with Israel and will explore what it means to be a Jew living in America as opposed to their Jewish peers living in Israel. Students will study Midrash as their text study, and will also continue their mentoring program as Madrichim and what it means to be a role model in our community. They will engage in a several week curriculum around the Holocaust.
